# Executive Summary

This report encapsulates the significant activities and outcomes from a series of events aimed at promoting climate justice and environmental sustainability in Somalia. The activities included the *"Role of Communities for Climate Justice Solutions"* workshop held on **June 1, 2025**, the *"Somali Women Climate Conference"* on **August 4, 2025**, the Environmental Grant Award competition, the successful Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign held on **August 21, 2025**, and a debate on the role of influencers and communities in climate justice solutions conducted on **August 30, 2025**.

The workshop emphasized the importance of empowering local communities and youth to take initiative in addressing climate challenges. It was marked by engaging presentations and discussions that highlighted the urgency of collective action and the need for innovative solutions to combat climate impacts.

The Somali Women Climate Conference focused on the unique challenges faced by Somali women in the context of climate change, advocating for their active involvement in decision-making processes and policy development. The conference provided a platform for sharing experiences and generating actionable outcomes to enhance women's roles in climate action.

The Environmental Grant Award recognized outstanding initiatives that promote climate action and environmental education. Notable projects included beach cleanups and art workshops, which engaged community members and raised awareness about climate issues.

The Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign showcased a grassroots effort that transformed one of Somalia's natural treasures, fostering community spirit and environmental stewardship.

Finally, the debate on the role of influencers and communities reinforced the significance of collaboration and dialogue among various stakeholders in promoting climate justice solutions.

Overall, these activities underscore the commitment of Somali communities, particularly women and youth, to tackle climate challenges through collaboration, innovation, and sustained engagement.



# Introduction

The escalating impacts of climate change pose significant challenges globally, with local communities often bearing the brunt of its effects, particularly in vulnerable regions like Somalia. In recognition of this pressing issue, a series of interconnected activities were organized to empower communities and encourage collective action toward climate justice.

**On June 1, 2025**, the workshop titled **"Role of Communities for Climate Justice Solutions in Somalia"** set the stage for an engaging dialogue among stakeholders committed to addressing climate challenges. This was followed by the **"Somali Women Climate Conference"** on **August 4, 2025**, which specifically focused on the unique experiences and contributions of Somali women in the climate discourse.

Additionally, the **Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign** took place on **August 21, 2025**, showcasing a grassroots effort to restore one of Somalia's cherished natural assets. The final event, a debate on the role of influencers and communities in climate justice solutions, occurred on **August 30, 2025**, emphasizing the importance of dialogue and collaboration.

These initiatives aimed not only to raise awareness but also to foster collaboration among various stakeholders, including government entities, civil society, and local communities. They provided platforms for sharing insights, generating actionable recommendations, and inspiring grassroots movements that advocate for sustainable practices.

This report details the events, discussions, and outcomes from these activities, illustrating the collective commitment of Somali communities to champion climate justice and environmental sustainability.



## Activity One: Workshop on Role of Communities for Climate Justice Solutions in Somalia.

### Workshop Overview and Highlights

On **June 1, 2025**, the workshop kicked off with an inspiring welcome from **Hani Asad Yasin**, the **Director of Programs at Action for Environment**. Hani greeted the guests and participants with enthusiasm, setting the tone for an engaging and impactful session. She outlined the workshop's objectives, emphasizing the importance of **"Empowering Influencers and Communities for Climate Justice Solutions in Somalia."** Her words resonated with the audience, highlighting the crucial role that local communities play in addressing climate challenges and fostering sustainable practices.

Hani also provided a comprehensive overview of the **African Activists for Climate Justice (AACJ)** Project, a five-year initiative funded by the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs, which is set to conclude at the end of this year. This project aims to bolster climate activism across Africa by empowering local leaders and communities to combat climate change while advocating for sustainable practices. She expressed heartfelt gratitude to **OXFAM** for their invaluable support in organizing the consultation workshop, emphasizing the collaborative effort necessary to tackle climate issues effectively.

Following Hani's remarks, **Hafsa Omar Abdilahi**, **Director of the Department of Climate Change at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC)**, officially opened the workshop, marking the beginning of an important dialogue among stakeholders committed to climate action.



**Saara Mukhtar Ali, Coordinator of the School Environmental Club at Action for Environment (A4E),** delivered an engaging presentation on "Green Meetings and Events." Her insights served as a catalyst for raising awareness about the significance of organizing environmentally friendly events and minimizing our carbon footprint. She encouraged participants to rethink how they plan and execute meetings, emphasizing that every small step toward sustainability counts.

**Fatima Ahmed Osman Gael, a Climate Change and Environmental Science Researcher,** followed with an enlightening presentation on "**Somalia's Current Status of Climate Change: Challenges and Solutions.**" Her thorough analysis provided a sobering look at the pressing issues facing Somalia while also outlining potential pathways forward. Fatima's expertise underscored the urgency of collective action and the need for innovative solutions to combat climate impacts.

**Abdikafi Hassan Abdi, Head of Research at the Institute of Climate and Environment of SIMAD University,** addressed "**The Role of Youth Activists and Influencers in Climate Justice.**" He highlighted the vital contributions of the younger generation in driving change, stressing that youth activism is essential for shaping future policies and practices. His message resonated strongly, inspiring many participants to consider their own roles as advocates for climate justice.

## Activity Two: Somali Women Climate Conference 2025

In her welcoming remarks, she emphasized the disproportionate impact of climate change on Somali women, highlighting their vital role in finding solutions and participating in decision-making processes.



## Objectives of the Somali Women Climate Conference

## Welcoming Remarks

Yasin concluded by advocating for genuine climate justice for women and expressed gratitude to the conference organizers, including SWECC, A4E, and OXFAM for their support.

## Presentation on National Climate Change Efforts and Action Plans

---

Hafsa Abdillahi Omar, Director of Climate Change at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change of the Federal Government of Somalia, delivered a comprehensive presentation on the country's National Climate Change Efforts and Action Plans. She provided an overview of Somalia's environmental policies, highlighting the National Climate Change Policy, which establishes a framework for the nation's response to climate change. This policy aims to build a climate-resilient economy through several key strategies, including adapting to climate impacts, reducing emissions, protecting vulnerable communities, coordinating climate action, and securing funding and capacity building.

Hafsa also discussed the National Transformation Plan (NTP) 2025-2029, articulating its vision of a prosperous, stable, inclusive, and climate-resilient Somalia, aligned with the Centennial Vision 2060 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Additionally, she briefed attendees on Somalia's Climate Action Journey from 2013 to 2025, touching on the progress of the National Adaptation Plan (NAP) and the newly launched NDC3.0.

## Panel Discussion I: Empowering Somali Women:

### Education and Advocacy for Stronger Voice in Decision-Making

The panel moderated by Naima Said from Bilan Media focused on empowering Somali women through education and advocacy to strengthen their voices in decision-making. The discussion featured esteemed panelists: Mariam Dini, Founder of Empowered by Mariam and UNESCO SDG4 Country Representative; Sirad Mohamed, Founding Director of Mama Ugaaso Foundation; and Ugbad Nour Abdilahi, Strategic Planning Advisor and Climate Focal Point at the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs.

Mariam Dini emphasized the critical intersection of education and advocacy, stating that empowering Somali women through education is essential for enhancing their roles in decision-making processes. She highlighted the need for educational programs that address both climate change and women's rights.

Sirad Mohamed underscored the importance of community based initiatives that support women's health and resilience against climate change. She pointed out that local organizations play a pivotal role in addressing the unique challenges faced by women, particularly in rural areas, advocating for increased collaboration between grassroots organizations and government entities.

Ugbad Nour Abdilahi stressed the necessity of legal and institutional reforms to empower Somali women in climate policy-making, arguing that such reforms are essential for ensuring women's participation in shaping climate-related laws and strategies.

The panel concluded with actionable steps to elevate women's roles in climate resilience and policy design, including enhancing education, promoting inclusive governance, and fostering community development initiatives that prioritize women's leadership. The session ended with a shared commitment to advocating for Somali women's voices in decision-making processes, recognizing their vital role in addressing climate challenges.



## Panel Discussion II: Navigating Climate Change: The Impact of Climate Change on Somali Women, Water, Health, and Food Security

The panel moderated by Farhia Mohamud, Director of Banadir TV, focused on "Navigating Climate Change: The Impact of Climate Change on Somali Women, Water, Health, and Food Security." The discussion featured three esteemed panelists: Najma Khalif Mohamed, Director of Somali Women in Environment and Climate Change; Safia Shukri Hilowle, WASH Specialist at the Ministry of Health, Federal Government of Somalia; and Fatima Sheikh Ali, Director of the Somali Agricultural Women Association.

Safia Shukri Hilowle addressed how climate change affects the spread of climate-sensitive diseases in Somalia, particularly for women in rural areas with limited healthcare access. She explained that rising temperatures and erratic rainfall exacerbate health risks, leading to increased incidences of diseases like cholera and malaria.

Fatima Sheikh Ali discussed the adaptability of Somali women farmers to climate challenges such as droughts and floods. She emphasized that women are diversifying crops and utilizing traditional knowledge to cope with these challenges. However, she highlighted the need for more support in resources, training, and financial assistance to ensure food security for families and communities.

Najma Khalif Mohamed spoke about the challenges Somali women face regarding the environment and climate, including water shortages and environmental degradation. She advocated for empowering women to lead in environmental protection and called for policies that support their resilience against climate related shocks.

All panelists emphasized the need for comprehensive approaches that address climate vulnerability and improve access to essential services like water, health, and food. They agreed that strengthening these services is vital for enhancing the resilience of Somali women, particularly in rural areas.

The discussion concluded with a call for collaborative efforts to develop and implement policies that prioritize women's needs and contributions in the context of climate change, recognizing their critical role in fostering community resilience.



## Closing Remarks by Hafsa Abdillahi Omar, Director of Climate Change at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change

Hafsa Abdillahi Omar closed the conference by highlighting the urgent need to address climate change impacts on vulnerable populations, particularly Somali women. She emphasized the interconnected challenges of climate-sensitive diseases, food insecurity, and limited access to resources.

Omar asserted that empowering women is essential for effective climate action, stating, “Women are key agents of change.” She urged all stakeholders government, civil society, and international partners to collaborate in ensuring women’s voices are included in climate policies and decision-making.

In her concluding remarks, she called for frameworks that support women’s leadership in environmental protection and adaptation. Despite the challenges, Omar expressed confidence that, through unity and commitment, a sustainable future for all Somalis is achievable. She thanked participants for their engagement and encouraged continued collaboration to make a meaningful impact.



## Activity Three: Environmental Grant Award

We conducted a competition for the Environmental Grant Award, aimed at supporting initiatives that align with the Climate, Environment, and Sustainability Education Grants criteria. The goal was to enhance community engagement in climate action and environmental conservation through innovative projects.

The Environmental Grant Award supported initiatives that promote climate action and environmental education.

The **1st Place winner**, Ololaha Nadaafada Xeebaha iyo Wacyi gelinta Deegaanka (**Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign**), led by **Abdisatar Arabow**, organized beach cleanup events over three Fridays in August, 2025. The team coordinated with local authorities and engaged the community through social media and flyers. Volunteers collected litter, segregated waste, and received refreshments as incentives. A debriefing session followed to discuss impacts and gather feedback. The campaign not only cleaned the beach but also raised awareness about the importance of maintaining clean environments, fostering a sense of responsibility within the community.

The **2nd Place winner**, **Creative4Climate**, a climate art studio led by **Khadra Ali**, conducted a two-day art workshop for young women, focusing on climate awareness through artistic expression. Participants created artwork reflecting environmental issues using supplies purchased with grant funds. An exhibition showcased their work, and plans to establish a community art group for ongoing engagement were discussed. The workshop also provided a platform for participants to share their personal stories and experiences related to climate change, empowering them to use art as a medium for advocacy and education in their communities.



The **3rd Place winner, GeedSoor**, led by **Mohamed Osman**, educated students on climate action through interactive sessions and tree planting activities in local schools. Students learned about tree care and planted native species, with funds used for educational materials and supplies. The initiative included ongoing monitoring and maintenance of the planted trees. By involving students directly in the planting process, the initiative instilled a sense of ownership and responsibility towards their environment, encouraging them to become active participants in climate action beyond the classroom.

These winning grants exemplify community engagement and environmental education, addressing local climate challenges while fostering awareness and participation. Action for Environment together with Oxfam Somalia are proud to support their impactful efforts in promoting sustainability and climate justice.



## Activity Four: The Success Story of the Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign in Mogadishu

The success story documented in a captivating video from the Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign showcases an extraordinary community effort to restore one of Somalia's most cherished natural assets. Located in Mogadishu, Lido Beach has long been plagued by pollution, threatening marine life, human health, and the local economy. However, since the collapse of the central government in 1991, a dedicated group of volunteers has risen to the challenge, transforming the beach into a cleaner and more inviting destination.

Initiated in 2021 by **Eng. Abdisatar Arabow**, this grassroots campaign began with a small team of six young volunteers who committed to cleaning the beach every Friday morning at sunrise. Their efforts have blossomed into a movement that has continued for over 200 consecutive weeks, revitalizing the beauty of Lido Beach. The Coastal Clean-up and Environmental Awareness Campaign not only focuses on cleaning the beaches but also emphasizes educating the community and promoting marine environmental protection. Today, visitors can enjoy the pristine sands and sparkling waves, a testament to the hard work and dedication of these volunteers.

The campaign has expanded significantly, attracting hundreds of participants each week, including individuals with special needs like Mr. Jeylani, who has been a steadfast member since the beginning. His unwavering commitment exemplifies how change can emerge from a few dedicated individuals who share a common vision for a cleaner environment.

Moreover, the initiative promotes awareness among local communities and businesses about the importance of cleanliness and environmental stewardship. By fostering collaboration among government institutions, civil society, students, and local entrepreneurs, the campaign has become a collective effort that embodies community spirit. Active participation from diverse groups, including youth, women, and families, has inspired greater awareness of volunteerism and environmental conservation.



Taking place **every Friday at 6:00 AM**, the cleanup sessions occur at a time when many are still resting. The young volunteers sacrifice their leisure time to fulfill this national duty, standing as examples of leadership and community engagement. Their commitment highlights the power of collective action in addressing environmental challenges and restoring the beauty of Somalia's coastline. The Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign is not just a cleanup effort; it is a movement that embodies hope, resilience, and the spirit of community.



## Activity Five: Debate on the Role of Influencers and Communities for Climate Justice Solutions in Somalia.

On August 30, 2025, the final event of the project focused on the role of influencers and communities in promoting climate justice solutions in Somalia. The debate aimed to engage various stakeholders in discussing the impact of social media and community involvement in addressing climate challenges.

**Hani Asad Yasin, Director of Programs at Action for Environment (A4E)**, warmly welcomed participants to the debate, emphasizing the importance of collaboration and dialogue among influencers and community members to foster climate action.

The event featured influential speakers, including **Ahmed Abdi Osman, Youth and Climate Change Focal Point at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC)**, who highlighted the government's role in supporting youth initiatives; **Sagal Ali Ibrahim, a prominent social media influencer**, who discussed the power of digital platforms in raising awareness and mobilizing communities; and **Abdishakur Daaha, a climate storyteller**, who shared compelling narratives that connect local communities to global climate issues.

The series of activities we carried out focused on empowering influencers and communities for climate justice solutions in Somalia has underscored the strong commitment of local communities, particularly women and youth, to address the challenges posed by climate change. The workshop emphasized the pivotal roles that communities play in climate action, while the Somali Women Climate Conference actively engaged women in decision-making processes.

The Environmental Grant Award competition showcased innovative grassroots initiatives that fostered community engagement and education, exemplified by the successful Lido Beach Cleanup Campaign. Additionally, the debate highlighted the critical collaboration between influencers and community members in advancing climate justice.

Moving forward, it is essential to build on this momentum through continued collaboration among government, civil society, and community stakeholders. By amplifying the voices of those most affected by climate change, Somalia can work toward a sustainable and equitable future, ensuring that the commitment demonstrated in these events translates into impactful action for climate justice.
